Frances Willard	An American educator, temperance reformer, and women's suffragist; her influence was important to the passage of the 18th & 19th Amendments; also the National President of Woman's Christian Temperance Union	
Susan B. Anthony	A pioneer crusader for women's suffrage in the U.S.; president of the National Woman Suffrage Association; her work helped pave the way for the 19th Amendment (1920)	
Elizabeth Cady Stanton	An abolitionist, human rights activist and one of the first leaders of women's rights movements; drafted the first organized demand for women's suffrage in 1848 at the Seneca Falls Convention	
	"Trust buster," conservationist and supported progressive reforms; served as 26th President of the U.S. and passed the Pure Food and Drug Act, which established the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to regulate food safety

<p>Progressive Era & Movement</p>	<p>A period of great social, political, and economic reforms needed after the corrupt Gilded Age; people who questioned the dominance of corporations (businesses) in society and tried to restore economic opportunities, and correct injustices in American life</p>	
<p>Pure Food and Drug Act</p>		
<p>Square Deal</p>	<p>Enacted by President Theodore Roosevelt; a set of policies that attempted to prevent further labor abuses and improve workplace safety, protect the natural landscape, and improve overall health and wellbeing of Americans</p>

<p>18th Amendment</p>		
<p>W.E.B. Dubois</p>	<p>An African-American sociologist, historian author, editor, and activist who was the most important protest leader during first part of 20th century; helped create the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP)</p>	
<p>Social Gospel</p>	<p>A movement started when Protestant ministers began to call for social reform, intent to apply Christian ethics to solve social problems; failed to impact reform movement</p>	
<p>17th Amendment</p>		

	<p>An African-American educator and reformer, founded Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute in 1881 and the National Negro Business League (1901); most influential spokesman for Black Americans between 1895-1915</p>
